



New Parents



If you've given birth while abroad, you need to do a few things:

IF BOTH PARENTS ARE U.S. CITIZENS:

1. Get the birth certificate.
 - a. Child born at off-post (Korean) hospital: the hospital should issue a report or record of birth. Request at least one sealed copy and a copy that can be translated into English.
 - b. Child born at on-post (Army) hospital: A report of birth will be issued.
2. *Apply for a Report of Birth Abroad using DS-2029, "Application for a Consular Report of Birth Abroad".
 - a. This will allow you to document your child's U.S. citizenship.
 - b. You'll need at least the following supporting documents:
 - i. Child's birth certificate (original and two copies).
 - ii. Evidence of parent(s) U.S. citizenship (e.g. passport, birth certificate) (original and two copies)
 - iii. Evidence of parents' marriage or divorce, if applicable (original and one copy)
 - iv. Photograph of child (2" by 2", white background, open eyes, no parents' hands)
 - v. Photo identification for parents (e.g. military identification card) (originals and two copies)
 - c. The fee for a minor's passport book application is \$105, or \$120 if you also want the passport card.
3. *Apply for a Social Security Card using SS-5, "Application for a Social Security Card" (do with DS-2029).
4. *Apply for a U.S. passport using DS-11, "Application for U.S. Passport" (do with DS-2029 and SS-5).
5. *If the child will remain in Korea for more than 30 days, apply for a Korean Visa.
6. Apply to enroll your child in DEERS using DD Form 1172.

IF ONLY ONE PARENT IS A U.S. CITIZEN:

1. Same as above.
2. *Same as above, but you'll also need to submit:
 - a. Evidence that the U.S. citizen parent resided in the U.S. for at least five years (e.g. school records, LES) before the birth.
 - b. If the U.S. citizen is the father, evidence that he is the biological father.
 - i. Affidavits from both parents stating that they are the natural/biological parents.
 - ii. If the father is in the military, a copy of his orders.
3. *See step 2.
4. *See step 2.
5. *Same as above, if the mother is not Korean. If the mother is Korean, the child only needs to obtain a Visa if he obtains U.S. citizenship.
6. Same as above.

***Special Instructions for Steps 2-5**

1. These steps can be processed at:
 - a. Camp Casey: ACS, at 730-3107
 - b. Osan Air Base: Mr. Kim, Building 936, Room 118, 784-6719
 - c. Yongsan: Yongsan Legal Center, 738-8111
2. You will need to appear in person at one of these places, or at the U.S. Embassy in Seoul, with your child.
3. The total fee for all of the steps is **\$205.00** (U.S. dollars).

How long will all this take?

- Passports / Reports of Birth Abroad: approximately 2 – 3 weeks
- Social Security Number: the SSN will be delivered to the address provided by the parents in 4 – 6 months

Where can I get more information?

Army Community Service (ACS) is available to provide information and assistance with applying for passports, SOFA Visas, and Reports of Birth Abroad. They are open Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and the first Thursday of the month, 1p.m. to 5p.m. Call your local ACS to register.
